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
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County football brought thrills from hot August to mid-December

The football season we welcomed in on those triple-digit afternoons in August lasted well into the Christmas shopping season, thanks to the Malakoff Tigers.

Malakoff once again took us on a long post season ride and a trip to the 3A D1 Championship Game and Athens again qualified for the playoffs, but the 2024 season was quite a bit different from 2023.

Malakoff shifted to a new district, 7-3A, that had them traveling east this year and before it was all said in done they had dusted off the best teams in the region. The Tigers had plenty of tools in their bag they could rely on, beginning with a sturdy defense, punishing ground game or and timely passes from quarterback Mike Jones.

The result was a 15-1 season and state runner-up status.

Athens was picked to make the playoffs, but few forecasts locked in on how solid this team would be. The Hornets were a complete team, shining in offense, defense and special teams. They finished second in 8-4A D2, behind state champion Carthage, voted the best small town team in the nation in one publication. Athens win total of eight was the most in a regular season in about a decade.

Beyond Athens and Malakoff, the successes were a little spottier, but every Henderson County team made a few memories. Brownsboro sent the seniors out with a thrilling win over Bullard. Cross Roads broke even on their non-district slate and Eustace cranked up the offense under coach James Cantrell.

Mabank's hard working defense challenged opposing offenses in a tough district, while Kemp and Trinidad each came up with a pair of wins during the season.

The local teams all got to test their mettle against some of the best in the state. Brownsboro and Athens each took on Carthage, Mabank had a district matchup with Kilgore and Eustace met Malakoff in 7-3A.

We hope this postlude to the season will amplify some of those high spots and rekindle some of those memories.


The Tigers' 15-1 season and state 3A D1 Championship Game appearance would be viewed as miraculous considering the week to week challenges they faced climbing the playoff rungs.

All that keeps the 2024 season from being held in higher regard is the fact that 2023 happened.

Last year's Tigers were 16-0, beat Franklin 14-7 at AT&T Stadium and set the bar for all future Tiger teams.

But, for a moment, lets look at the 2024 campaign as the amazing achievement it was for Coach Jamie Driskell's crew.

"If you win 15 wins in one sea-





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son, I'd definitely say that's a success," Driskell said.

Malakoff started the year with some key pieces back from 2023. It never hurts to have a quarterback like Mike Jones, who had thrown for 2,621 yards passing, 31 TDs; 831 yards rushing and 14 Tds in his junior year.

The Tigers were expected to contend for the District 7-3A D1 title, with another Top 10 team, the Winnsboro Red Raiders seen as their biggest obstacle along the way.

Malakoff's win streak was severely threatened at 18, when Madisonville came to town on Sept. 13. The Mustangs jumped on top 7-0 after the first quarter and fought throughout the night to keep the Tigers from getting the upper hand.

Madisonville fed Malakoff a steady diet of running back, Phillip Green who carried 23 times for 194 yards. They owned a 21-7 advantage in the third quarter, before Malakoff fought back to tie the score.


Malakoff trailed 28-21 late in the game when Malakoff QB, Jones, who hadn't had a good night throwing, went back for a last minute attempt. He hit Parker Poteete for a 46-yard score that brought the Tigers within a point. Malakoff handed to Jason Tennyson for the two-point conversion and a 29-28 win.

That was the last close game for the Tigers until they went to Winnsboro to decide the district championship. Malakoff outscored the Red Raiders, 35-28, on a night when Jones ran for 176 and Tennyson, 165.

Malakoff's playoff march began with romps over Tatum and Maypearl. Next came Jefferson who had the firepower to challenge the Tigers, in a 31-21 thriller. Liberty-Eylau followed in a dominant performace for Malakoff at Rose Stadium in Tyler. The Tigers pitched an unexpected shutout, 35-0.

In the state semifinal, The Tigers turned to their power, determination and big game experience to overcome a well coached and patient Paradise team that ate up more than 9-and-a-half minutes in a third quarter drive to go up 19-7.

Malakoff responded with a 74-yard march, fueled by running back Jason Tennyson, who plowed for consistent yardage despite nursing





an ankle sprain. Tennyson polished off the final 11 yards of the drive with a TD run on the first play of the fourth quarter. Jacob Padron added the point after, leaving Malakoff down by only five, 19-14.

What followed was the defensive play of the game. Facing third and seven, from their own 22, Paradise quarterback, Ayden Winters, rolled out to pass, he was hit and the ball flew to Tigers defensive back, Jack Hustead, who traveled 34 yards untouched for the touchdown.

Malakoff led, 20-19 and elected to go for two to give themselves a three-point lead.

Malakoff stopped Paradise and took over on the 26, be-

charged into the end zone, with about three minutes left.

Malakoff led 27-19 and made it stand up against a late Paradise threat.

The final game featured an excellent Malakoff drive after Columbus took an early 7-0 lead. The Tigers went 80 yards, scoring on a four-yard Jerrion Hall run, set up by a 21-yard pass to James Studley.

After that, Columbus dominated, winning 48-14.

"They're really good," Driskell said of the talent laden Cardinals.

Driskell said the Tigers "gave and gave and gave," until they ran out of gas.

> Even so, the 2024 season continued the legacy of success they've had since Driskell came to town. The trip to the final was the Tigers' third showdown at AT&T Stadium for a state crown since 2018.

The sting of Malakoff's only loss in the past two seasons was still on his mind when Coach Jamie Driskell reflected on the year.

His team had battled through six weeks of playoffs after a 10 week regular season and was spent. The final was a 48-14 loss to Columbus, a most unusual outcome for a team that had outscored opponents 731 to 208.

"This group of seniors, hats off to them," Driskell said. "They're just a great group of kids. They're fun to be around. They've done so much for this program the past three years.

The leadership on the team helped their cruise through the stormy playoff seas that required them to play four of the state's Top 5 teams.

"It starts with Mikey (Mike Jones) at the quarterback position," Driskell said. "He's our leader. I think we have 16 seniors and I just love them to death. They're going to be successful

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later in life. They've got great work ethic, great character and I couldn't be any prouder of them."

Malakoff fans have been treated to some high level games in recent years and have made their presence felt in Tyler, Frisco, Arlington and wherever the Tigers have gone. Driskell acknowledged the support of the community for the players in his program.

"It's typical, small town football," Driskell said. "Everybody can't wait for Friday night. That's how it is in Malakoff now. We have great support. It's good for the town. I hate that we didn't do well tonight for them, but I think they're going to be really proud of this group of kids." They're going to be successful later in life. 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

RUNNING WITH THE WIND Athens weathers opening storm for excellent year

By Rich Flowers Photo by Mark Bennett The Athens Hornets hit the road to Henderson in August with high hopes for the new season, only to be greeted with thunder, lightning and buckets of rain.

Athens fell behind early and lost 45-35. Looking at an 0-1 record and a tough non-district slate, the Hornets rebounded to win their next five, scoring more than 30 every time. Athens finished 8-3 after a 38-30 loss against Van in the playoffs for the Hornet's best season under Coach Zac Harrell and their most regular season wins since 2013.

"We played some really good teams and played high level football throughout the season. And we had definitely a good chance to win that that playoff game," Harrell said.

Kaufman came to Athens in week two. The Lions, who finished 7-5 in a 5A Division 2 district kept pace with the Hornets before Athens closed the door on a 35-28 win. Following the game with the Lions, Athens' defense started to assert itself. They held Palestine to one touchdown and shut out Jacksonville.

Athens opened district at home against Brownsboro and found the Bears to be hard to put away. After leading, 21-7, after one quarter, Athens took a 28-14 lead into intermission. Brownsboro scored in the third to stay on the Hornets' heels going into the fourth quarter.

Athens had an outstanding passing game from Thatcher Diamond, who was in for injured David Richardson. Diamond hit 14 of 19 for four touchdowns. Jase Warren ran for 124 yards on just 10 carries.

Athens lost to Carthage on Oct. 18 and returned home in a showdown to decide second place against another solid team, from Center. Center was a slight favorite.







Best Game: Athens 43 Center 26

Early in the game, Center lived up to billing as an offensive power, jumping to a 10-0 first quarter lead.

Athens rolled up three scores in the second quarter and led 21-20 at the half.

Athens scored two more touchdowns in the third quarter, while the defense tethered the Roughriders in the second half to pull away for the win.

Dray Russell, Eli Carnes and Mason Shelton were all in double digits in tackles.

Richardson hit 13 of 19 for 193 yards and a score. Warren fought for tough yards and scored three times.

The Hornets got down early in the game, but as they did throughout the year, fought back.

"A thing that makes this season pretty remarkable is our team was able to overcome a lot of adversity," Harrell said. "We lost, three offensive linemen before district play started, played two district games without starting quarterback. And really he played the entire season on a hurt foot. So, we were able to overcome some things that I think a lot of teams and programs may not have been able to.

I think that speaks to the culture of our program and how our kids just kept playing for each other and kept believing, no matter what happens, trying to control what we can control."

Harrell said any look at the Hornets' success has to credit the senior captains.

"You gotta start with Jase Warren and Mason Shelton, Harrell said. "They've played three years of varsity football and they both elevated their play to a level that they hadn't even shown in previous years. Jase really took over the running back position and played it better than I think anyone anticipated him playing. That's while also playing almost every down on defense. To play linebacker and running back at our level of play is really a pretty remarkable feat. And Mason Shelton is very similar as far as playing almost every down on both sides of the ball." Harrell said the play and leadership of Warren and Shelton will be hard to replace.

"I think, after them, you have Drayvon Russell also had a great senior season, playing both sides of the ball at safety and outside.

We had a lot of juniors really step up and play big. I think Emmanuel Moore took the next step. If you go back and look at the second half of Waco Connally and that five or six game stretch that he played. He had pretty remarkable numbers and some of the catches he was able to make, one hand catches, that a lot of guys don't make.

Julius Brewer had a great season as a junior taking over the slot position. And, you've got to talk about David Richardson and what he was able to do."

Richardson was not able to run for the second half of the season because of an injury

to his foot. Harrell said his passing was much improved this season and helped keep the offense moving.

On the offensive line, it was Brandon Casas, Jose Pimentel and Gus Wickel, all three of those guys.

Gus had to switch positions, go from right tackle to center, and really came on at the end of the year and started playing really well.

Harrell also mentioned Charles Livingston, Jayden Davis and Eli Carnes as rugged defenders.


"A lot of guys really stepped up and that's why we're excited about what we have coming back. We have nine starters on offense and six on defense expected to return," Harrell said.

Best Game; Brownsboro 31 Bullard 30

The Bears picked up a win in their ninth game of the season when they snared the Bullard Panthers, 31-30. The issue was in doubt to the finish.

""I'm super happy for our kids. They have fought and given us all they had, all year" Connot said. "They deserved this win."

The Panthers, who needed the win to put themselves in position for the playoffs, looked as if they were going to pull away in the third quarter.

Up 30-19, Bullard had another chance to score, but the Bears' Bralen Kirkpatrick recov-



ered a fumble, to keep Brownsboro in the game.

Hendricks scored his fourth touchdown of the night on a spectacular 46 yard touchdown pass from Thompson. Kirkpatrick scored the final Bear touchdown on a determined one yard run. That gave Brownsboro its final lead and set the stage for a last ditch Bullard drive. As time ran out, Crew Bowman heaved a 51 yard pass into the end zone, that was caught by Campbell Pawlak.

Chris Frederick reported on the final, frenzied seconds. "The Bullard fans went crazy. But there was a little yellow flag that was thrown and offensive pass interference was called, and the Brownsboro fans went crazy."

The penalty ended the fame with Bullard on the outside, looking in. The Bears' final home game sent the seniors out with a dramatic win.

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

Better than before

Eustace takes step forward in 2024

> The Eustace Bulldogs found the end zone with more frequency this season than last year, but couldn't keep pace with Malakoff or Winnsboro who led District 7-3A D1.

> The Dogs averaged 23-per-game after less than eight points the year before. Coach James Cantrell, who came out of retirement for 2024, before announcing he was hanging up his whistle again at the end of the year, said the Bulldogs would not hesitate to put the ball in the air this season.

In week two, Eustace scored 42 in an eight point loss to the Buffalo Bison. Senior quarterback Rhett Dyer completed 13 of 26 for 263 yards and four touchdowns But that's not all that worked for the Bulldogs. Senior running back Mason Patek carried 26 times for 184 yards and two scores.

The following week, Rice came to the Bone Yard and got bullied by a score of 42-14. Patek again was a workhorse, picking up 195 yards on 30 carries. The 5 feet 9, 160 pound runner scored twice.

On Sept. 27, Rains came to Eustace and won 51-40. Dyer threw for 236 yards and two scores to keep the Dogs within striking distance.

On October 4, Eustace went to Mount Vernon and was on the verge of a district win, leading 35-28 after three quarters. The Tigers tied it at 35-all and sent it into overtime. Kemp moves into Class 4A Division 2



The Kemp Yellowjackets faced the challenge of moving up in classification in 2024, an always tough undertaking.

The result was a 2-8 season record and an 0-5 mark in 6-4A D2. Coach Tavarus "B.J." Rider entered the fray with a small roster – less than thirty suited up in the orange this year. When asked if many of his players would play both ways, Rider said "all ways," meaning offensively, defensively and on special teams.

The 2024 season extended the string of 2-8 seasons for Kemp to three.

The Jackets' wins were on consecutive nights in September. Kemp hung a 62-0 shutout on Inspired Vision of Dallas and thumped Rice, 17-10.

With an enrollment of 590, Kemp was by far the smallest school in its new district. Canton is next smallest, with 682.

The Yellowjackets went on the road to pick up their second straight win. In their final non-district game, the Yellowjackets led 7-3 at halftime and kept the pressure on defensively in the second half.

Kemp also put in a tough performance against 4A D1 foe, Mabank. The Panthers jump ahead early, but Kemp stayed in the contest, falling 20-7.
