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TRINITY VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE OVERVIEW

MISSION STATEMENT

Trinity Valley Community College is a learning-centered college that provides quality academic, workforce, college preparatory, student support, and community services programs that prepare and empower students for success and promote and enhance life-long learning for all communities served.

HISTORY

Trinity Valley Community College was born in 1946 from the desire of a few community leaders to provide educational and vocational opportunities for post-World War II Henderson County citizens. Many things have changed since those first days when the campus consisted of a lone building on a dusty lot in Athens, but that dedication to students of this region which first stirred leaders to action is still the motivation that drives every decision at the College.

At the heart of TVCC's mission statement is a commitment that the College is first and foremost learning-centered. This commitment puts students first and causes all the College does to be funneled through a couple of simple questions – does this benefit our students, and does this benefit our community?

The mission statement encompasses the many facets of TVCC, from preparing students to advance in their college careers, to preparing a trained workforce, and even the many programs, services and activities of the College that enhance life and provide new opportunities for the people in our communities. TVCC's open-door admissions policy allows the College to better serve the diverse population who seek those opportunities.

TVCC was founded by a group of Athens civic leaders in 1946 as Henderson County Junior College. The creation of the College was formally approved by voters in spring of 1946, and the first courses were conducted in temporary facilities at Athens High School in the summer of 1946. In fall 1946, classes were moved to a dedicated property provided by the board of trustees, which remains as the main campus in Athens.

Responsive to the needs of its students and service area, the College became a multi-campus institution with the initiation of instructional programs at the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Coffield, Beto I, Powledge and Michael units beginning in 1969. TVCC established additional campuses in Palestine in 1972, Terrell in 1973 and the Health Science Center in Kaufman in 1983.

As a result of continued regional expansion of the College, the board of trustees authorized and approved a name change from Henderson County Junior College to Trinity Valley Community College in September 1986. Since its inception, the College has grown from a single campus of 256 students and 12 faculty members, primarily from Henderson County, to a five-campus college district with 6,700 students, 142 full-time faculty, and 116 part-time faculty as of fall 2015.

TVCC has a proud heritage of service to its region, ever changing and adapting to support the needs of its community and student body. Those who founded the College could not have imagined the changes that have taken place in the past 70 years, and it's hard to imagine now what the future holds for TVCC. History tells us, however, that TVCC will be focused on student success.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

TVCC exists for the following purposes:

- Technical programs up to two years in length leading to an associate degree or certificates;
- Vocational programs leading directly to employment in semi-skilled or skilled occupations;
- Freshman and/or sophomore courses in arts and sciences;
- Continuing adult education programs for occupational or cultural upgrading;
- Compensatory education programs designed to fulfill the commitment of an admissions policy that allow the enrollment of disadvantaged students;
- A continuing program of counseling and guidance designed to assist students in achieving their individual educational goals;
- Workforce development program designed to meet local and statewide needs;
- Adult literacy and other basic skills programs for adults; and
- Other purposes as may be prescribed by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for post-secondary education in Texas.

FROM THE DESK OF DR. GLENDON S. FORGEY

Trinity Valley Community College is nearing the end of one of the most successful years in the history of the College, if not **the** most successful. The amazing achievements of the College are true indications of the excellent quality of faculty, staff and students at TVCC. Here are highlights of some of the outstanding things the College has done this year:

- After thousands of hours of work by numerous TVCC faculty and staff, the College submitted its compliance report for accreditation to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges.
- The College was once again named to the Aspen Institute list of top 10% colleges in the nation. The College has been on the list every time the list has been announced..... four consecutive times!
- TVCC was ranked the 16th best college in the nation in the SmartAsset study.
- The Iota Alpha chapter of Phi Theta Kappa won four major awards and ranked third (Second Finalist to the Most Distinguished Chapter) in the world.
- Numerous faculty and staff have been recognized statewide and nationally. Brandon Barnes, Kirk Overmoe, Helen Reid, and Nancy Long, are just a few of the award winners.
- For the second consecutive year, the TVCC News-Journal online newspaper won first place for its website among Division II schools in the Texas Community College Journalism Association.
- The Kaufman vocational nursing program had a 90% pass rate for 2015. Programs with 90% or above receive a commendation from the Board of Nursing during the next approval period.
- The College partnered with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) allowing the TDCJ to provide training to approximately 4,000 employees at the Palestine Workforce Center on an annual basis.
- The College partnered with the Terrell Economic Development Corporation, the Terrell ISD, and the Terrell Education Foundation to create a Career and Technical Education Program. The program received statewide recognition and was given the Workforce Excellence Award by the Texas Economic Development Council.
- The Beef Cattle Show Team brought home eight top-three awards, including four blue ribbons for first place in the Open Charolais Cattle division of the 2015 Four States Fair Livestock Show in Texarkana, AR.
- The Student Government Association was named regional chapter of the year.
- The cheer team won the national cheer championship for the 10th time in the history of the program and won the Grand Championship among **all** colleges and universities.

- The TVCC partner stunt team of T. J Ollison and Sabrina Garcia, competing against **all** colleges and universities, won the national championship.
- The football team won its third consecutive conference regular season football championship.
- The men’s basketball team won the conference and regional championship with a perfect, unbeaten record and advanced to the elite eight in the NJCAA national championship tournament.
- The women’s basketball team won its 14th straight conference championship and finished runner up in the NJCAA national championship tournament.
- The College dedicated the TVCC softball field after former vice president of student services, Dr. W. P. “Rip” Drumgoole.
- A record \$12,000 was raised for the Play 4 Kay Yow Cancer Fund; the most of any community college in the nation.
- The Cardette sophomores won first place in their division at the Universal Dance Association Regional contest.

Yes, it has been a very historic year. The communities we serve can take great pride in their college. TVCC is one of the best community colleges in the nation and the future remains bright!












Fall 2015 Enrollment by Status

Fall 2015 Enrollment by Gender



Fall 2015 Enrollment by Student Age Groups





ENROLLMENT UNDUPLICATED HEADCOUNT




ENROLLMENT BY AGE





FIRST TIME IN COLLEGE STUDENTS ENROLLED IN DEVELOPMENTAL EDUCATION




DISTANCE LEARNING

Campus by Count





IN-DISTRICT STUDENT POPULATION BY SERVICE AREA COUNTY




RATIO OF TRADITIONAL TO HIGH SCHOOL AND INCARCERATED STUDENTS



ATTENDANCE BY CAMPUS




SEMESTER CREDIT AND CONTACT HOURS DELIVERED BY EDUCATION TYPE

SEMESTER CREDIT HOURS










GRADUATION RATES FOR FIRST TIME IN COLLEGE STUDENTS









DEVELOPMENTAL WRITING SUCCESS





Technical education are those courses that are considered workforce and lead to an Associate of Applied Science degree or Certificate of Completion.






FULL-TIME VERSUS PART-TIME STAFF


NON-INSTRUCTIONAL EMPLOYEES BY TYPE

COMPARISON OF TVCC FACULTY COMPOSITION TO TEXAS STATE AVERAGES




COMPARISON OF TVCC FACULTY FULL-TIME/PART-TIME FACULTY RATIO TO TEXAS STATE AVERAGES

COMPARISON OVER MULTIPLE YEARS OF FULL-TIME/PART-TIME FACULTY TO TEXAS STATE AVERAGES




